- ✗ Trust your instincts. If you feel uncomfortable in a place or situation, leave quickly.

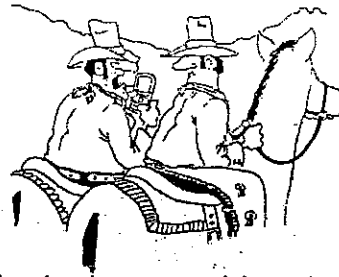
Tips for Walkers

"The absence of corrections yesterday was due to a technical hitch rather than any sudden onset of accuracy."

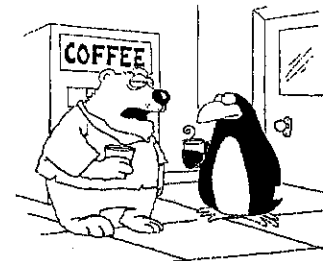

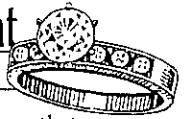
